Quality Music Preparation that Preserves the Voice: Practicing techniques, for the busy teacher or student, that preserve the voice and foster confident performances.

ABSTRACT:

Learning and preparing music for performances is challenging within voice students' and voice teachers' busy schedules. Learning music well takes concentration, time, and voice use. If the singer is talking for a large part of their day, keeping their voice fresh for practicing and performing is an added challenge. The solution is a clear practicing plan, time management skills, and moderation. Further, by rotating a variety of singing and non-singing practicing and polishing exercises and techniques, an artist can effectively learn and prepare music with excellence, while still conserving the voice. A customized and flexible daily practicing schedule can also help a singer to prepare either a single work, or multiple works simultaneously, while keeping their voice fresh for performing.

Dr. Penelope Shumate is a soprano and teaches Applied Voice, Lyric Diction, and Vocal Pedagogy at Western Illinois University, where she was selected as the winner of the 2018 University Provost's Award for Excellence in Scholarly/Creative/Performance/Professional Activities.
